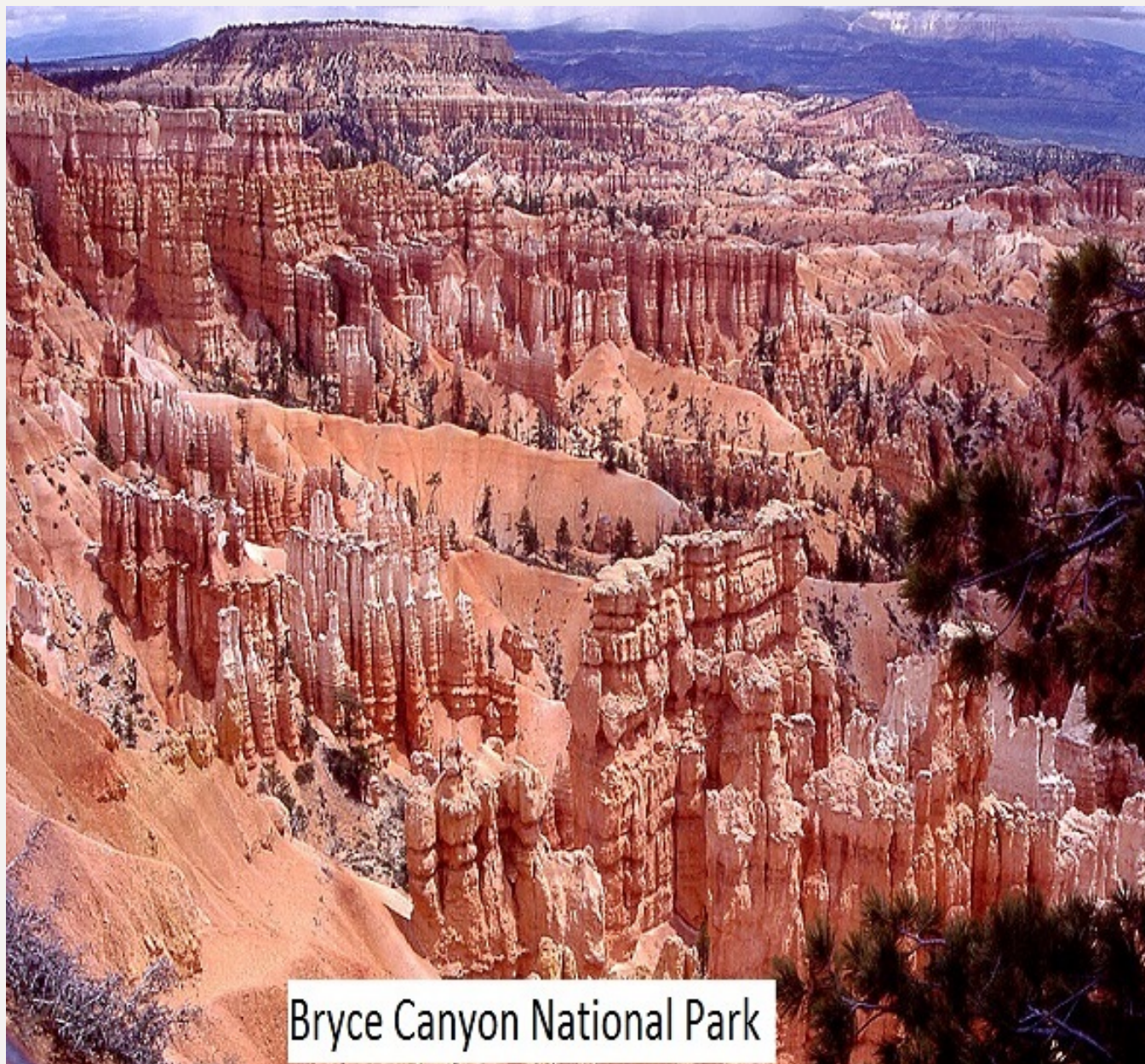

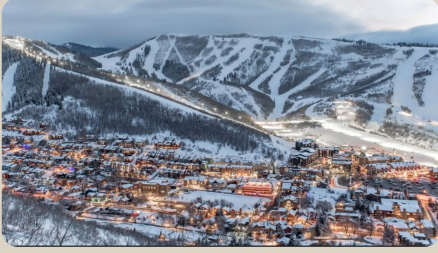

Day 1

Salt Lake City - Welcome to Salt Lake City

Arrive at Salt Lake City. Transfer to Hotel. Activities depending on time of arrival



Day 2

Salt Lake City - City Tour - Park City - Deer Valley

Breakfast. Proceed to Salt Lake City tour. Discover the world-famous architecture and delve into the heart of the city as you learn about its founders and their difficult journey across America. Marvel at the Utah State Capitol's stunning architecture as you revisit the dramatic struggles that led to Utah's statehood. Get to know Brigham Young, the man behind the myth, as you admire the Salt Lake City Tabernacle and the awe-inspiring Salt Lake City Temple. Don't just visit the city—discover the history beneath the surface!

Park City lies east of Salt Lake City in the western state of Utah. Framed by the craggy Wasatch Range, it's bordered by the Deer Valley Resort and the huge Park City Mountain Resort, both known for their ski slopes. Utah Olympic Park, to the north, hosted the 2002 Winter Olympics and is now predominantly a training facility.



Day 3

Salt Lake City - Idaho Falls

Idaho Falls is a city in Idaho. Hugging the Snake River, the Greenbelt is a system of trails with parks and a waterfall. The riverside Art Museum of Eastern Idaho showcases eclectic works. Downtown's Museum of Idaho has local-history exhibits, including items linked to the Lewis and Clark expedition and a re-created 1800s town. The Idaho Falls Zoo at Tautphaus Park has lions, sloths and penguins, plus a petting zoo



Day 4

Idaho Falls - Ashton - Warm River - Lower Mesa Water Falls - Upper Mesa Water Falls - Harriman State Park - West Yellowstone

At Upper Mesa Falls, a thunderous curtain of water – as tall as a 10-story building – pours over remnants of an ancient volcanic super-eruption that spewed ash over much of the current US. A mile south, Lower Mesa Falls repeats the performance; the river continually chiseling away at the solidified ash and lava. Approximately 50 percent of the world's hydrothermal features are at Yellowstone National Park, creating an effect that makes the ground appear to be on fire. The most famous of all the geysers is Old Faithful, one of the most popular and recognized natural wonders in the United States.



Day 5

Yellowstone - Mammoth Hot Springs - Upper West Yellowstone National Park - Old Faithful Geyser

One of the biggest advantages of entering Yellowstone from the west is the opportunity to see wildlife along the Madison River. Elk and bison are frequently spotted here, along with occasional sightings of bears and bald eagles. Old Faithful erupts more frequently than any of the other big geysers, although it is not the largest or most regular geyser in Yellowstone National Park. It is believed this regularity is in part due to no known connection with other hydrothermal features in the area.



Day 6

Yellowstone - Grand Teton - Jackson Hole

Grand Teton National Park is in the northwest of the US state of Wyoming. It encompasses the Teton mountain range, the 4,000-meter Grand Teton peak, and the valley known as Jackson Hole. It's a popular destination in summer for mountaineering, hiking, backcountry camping and fishing. Soaring over a landscape rich with wildlife, pristine lakes, and majestic alpine vistas, the Teton Range stands as a testament to generations of stewards. For over 11,000 years, communities have thrived in the valley known as Jackson Hole, turning these mountains into more than just peaks—they embody imagination and enduring human connection.

Day 7

Jackson Hole - Lava Hot Spring - Logan - Antelope Island State park - Salt Lake City

Antelope Island, with an area of 42 square miles, is the largest of ten islands located within the Great Salt Lake in Utah. The island lies in the southeastern portion of the lake, near Salt Lake City and Davis County, and becomes a peninsula when the lake is at extremely low levels. Despite its name, the park is most famous for its herd of bison. The size of the Antelope Island bison herd ranges from 550 to 700 animals and is controlled by an annual bison round-up. The Antelope Island bison herd is one of the oldest and largest in the United States.

Day 8

Salt Lake City - Dead Horse Point State Park - Moab - Hummer Sunset Safari Adventure

The sunset Hummer® Safari departs each evening just before sunset from the Moab Adventure Center. Within minutes of departure, you'll be scaling one of Moab's famous red rock fins on your way to an area known as "Hell's Revenge." We'll weave in and out of rock canyons, and feel the power and confidence of the Hummer as it climbs steep sandstone hills. While on the trip your guides will explain to you the geology of the area, along with the history of the Canyonlands area. Midway through our trip, you'll have an unforgettable experience as we ascend to the summit of a captivating overlook. As we head back on the trail, we'll stop to see ancient dinosaur tracks embedded in the rock surface. Here we'll relax, take pictures, and enjoy a snack or two while the desert sun paints the evening sky. Then climb aboard the Hummer® one last time as we head back to the Adventure Center.

Day 9

Moab - Arches National Park - Goblin Valley State Park - Capitol Reef National Park - Cedar City

Capitol Reef National Park is in Utah's south-central desert. It surrounds a long wrinkle in the earth known as the Water pocket Fold, with layers of golden sandstone, canyons and striking rock formations. Among the park's sights are the Chimney Rock pillar, the Hickman Bridge arch, and Capitol Reef, known for its white sandstone domes.



Day 10

Cedar City - Bryce Canyon

Bryce Canyon National Park, a sprawling reserve in southern Utah, is known for crimson-colored hoodoos, which are spire-shaped rock formations. The park's main road leads past the expansive Bryce Amphitheater, a hoodoo-filled depression lying below the Rim Trail hiking path. It has overlooks at Sunrise Point, Sunset Point, Inspiration Point and Bryce Point. Prime viewing times are around sunup and sundown.



Day 11

Cedar City - Zion National Park - Sand Hollow State Park - Las Vegas

Sand Hollow State Park is a popular recreational area in Utah, USA known for its reservoir and extensive off-highway vehicle (OHV) area. Located near Hurricane, Utah, it features a 1,322-acre reservoir and access to over 15,000 acres of dunes on Sand Mountain. The park offers a wide range of activities including boating, fishing, jet skiing, paddleboarding, ATV riding, kayaking, snorkeling, and cliff jumping.
